The PDBbind database is a collection of the experimentally measured binding affinities exclusively for the protein-ligand complexes available in the Protein Data Bank (PDB). It thus provides a link between energetic and structural information of those complexes and may be of great value to various molecular recognition studies. This site was last updated in 2007.
